This forest is important habitat for threatened species such as Tasmanian devils and quolls and a prime example of the unique ancient ecosystems that we stand to lose if the government fails to take action on forest protection in Tasmania. With logging starting now, these forests could be lost forever, before they have a chance to be protected by new forest reserves.
